or anyone who has taken Ken's place as my caregiver for, say, a couple of weeks while my husband goes fishing, they get a crash course on the demands of helping someone with a disability. Right away, my helper gets immersed in countless routines: catheters, leg bags, disinfecting urological equipment, and picking up meds from the pharmacy. They help me with chest percussion therapy, spirometer readings, and they have to blow my nose at least ten times a day. There are bed baths and nebulizers, and that's just scratching the surface. And after Ken comes home from fishing, these friends marvel and say, "People have no idea what you and Ken go through. They are clueless."

And they're right. People assume I just wake up and, here I am, all dressed with makeup on! And that's my point. People assume that families living with disability have everything covered. It's manageable, doable, reasonable... right?

Wrong! One individual, such as my husband, simply cannot do "it all," day after day after day, week in and week out. And it's not just Ken and me. It's

every family dealing with disability. Many parents who come to our Family Retreats are raising children with significant developmental delays. These boys and girls must be tube fed and toileted. Other children have autism; some with sleep disorders. Moms and dads-many who are single parents—need respite.

The dictionary describes respite as "an interval of relief." But it takes others who care enough to come in and provide that relief. It could be a neighbor who offers to learn a child's routine, or a Bible study friend, or a relative who can sit with an elderly family member and play checkers—anything constructive while caregivers take a much-needed break. Recently I lost the use of my right arm with which I feed myself. So, two evenings a week, my neighbor Kristen comes over and feeds me while Ken enjoys his dinner. It doesn't cost much time or effort, but who can place a value on that act of Christian kindness?! And when we say grace over our meal, we always bless the hands of Kristen who serves us. And, oh, do these respite providers deserve a blessing!



The need is great. Millions more respite workers are needed. It's why I'm so excited that Joni and Friends offers a wonderful program to provide relief for families.

Respite at Home is a universityaffiliated internship opportunity here at Joni and Friends which provides rest, hope, friendship, and encouragement to disabled children and their families. Participating students in select universities gain practical experience and insight into the unique joys and challenges experienced by families struggling with disability as they serve on a regular basis over the course of a semester. 
Finally, look for ways that you can help families that need a break. Begin by simply asking if there is some practical way you can assist. Assure the family that you don't mind being instructed in the

**66 T** amilies are excited for their Warrior to come home, but when  $\dashv$  he or she does, they find them to be more distant, separated, **L** and more isolated. It's a big adjustment for the whole family," explains Cedric. He and his wife, Michelle, have experienced this personally. Cedric is a Navy Veteran who served our country for six years as a gunner's mate and missile technician on the USS Arkansas. His military service included three deployments.

"Add Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) to the dynamic and the Warrior starts to have images-they feel regret, shame, even guilt over things they had to do on mission. It goes against their moral fabric," says Cedric. He and Michelle now serve as counselors at our Warrior Getaways.

Michelle explains, "Joni and Friends serves our Warriors who don't know where else to go, and Warrior Getaway is for the entire family."

"Our goal is to help Veterans move from post-traumatic stress to post-traumatic growth," says Cedric. "And we're giving them the tools to do so."

"Not to mention all the boating, arts and crafts, horseback riding, archery, and fishing!" adds Michelle. "And Warrior Getaway is founded in Christ, which is so important because Jesus Christ is literally the Answer. Jesus is the firm foundation that healing is built upon."



"Let me just say that personally, as a Veteran, I've seen both sides," says Cedric. "The side of the participant and the side of the facilitator here at *Warrior Getaway*. I've witnessed the changing of lives here, and it's because of all the love. Warrior Getaway gives Veterans an opportunity to process their experiences in a very safe environment."

Cedric is not only a Veteran-he and his wife, Michelle, serve as therapists at Warrior Getaway. "It's our opportunity to give back, says Cedric.

"And the Veteran's children are cared for so the adults can concentrate on their healing without worrying about their kids," says Michelle. Our Veterans-and their families-have made such great sacrifices to serve our country and protect our freedoms. And as a result, many come home with visible and invisible disabilities. But at Warrior Getaway, every member of the family finds help, hope, and healing in Christ.

**64 S** oldiers go to war. But the whole family deals with the aftermath of war," says Brittany. "And *Warrior Getaway* helps our family become stronger as a unit." Brittany's husband, Edward, protected our country as a Marine for fourteen years. He then re-enlisted in the military—this time in the Army. Throughout Edward's career, he was deployed seven times including tours of duty in Iraq, Afghanistan, Kuwait, and Saudi Arabia. He is a Desert Storm Veteran who explains matter-of-factly, "War is a different world altogether."

Edward now lives with a spinal cord injury and a traumatic brain injury, as well as post-traumatic stress disorder, high anxiety, and almost no short-term memory. His brain injury impacts his balance, requiring the use of a cane. And his PTSD manifests itself through flashbacks, fear, and anger.

*"Warrior Getaway* gives me comfort. When I talk to the other Veterans, I see that we have so many things in common," says Edward. *"When we come to Warrior Getaway* we take part in activities that help us grow, get stronger, and move forward. And it's because of Christ that we are all here."

"I've seen Veterans come to know Jesus and even get baptized at *Warrior Getaway,*" says Edward. "I feel uplifted and filled with the Holy Spirit here."

"Edward doesn't sleep well. He is restless and has nightmares," says Brittany. "And his anxiety has worn off on me, for sure. But Joni and Friends has definitely helped Edward manage his PTSD. Coming to *Warrior Getaway* gives Edward camaraderie with his fellow Veterans. We can't find this type of support with any other organizations. *Warrior Getaway* has helped us 100%."

"I don't know where our family would be without Joni and Friends. I am very thankful that God has used Joni and Friends to bring me closer to God and to experience life with others who live with a disability," says twelve-year-old Enoch, who has autism and communicates through assistive technology.

Family Retreat has impacted Enoch and his whole family in remarkable ways. As Enoch himself explains, *Family Retreat* is "heaven on earth for those of us living with a disability. Our suffering is alleviated for a little while, and here the glory of God is revealed."

Enoch loves to run. He's going non-stop for most of the day! So much so that his *Family Retreat* volunteer buddy averages 23,000 steps each day with Enoch. "Not only is my buddy serving me," says Enoch. "He's also serving our Most High God!" But *Family Retreat* isn't just a time for Enoch and his buddy to run. It's also a very special opportunity for Enoch to explore his love of nature. Hiking, swimming, and zip-lining help Enoch feel the love of Jesus while safely experiencing the great outdoors. At *Family Retreat*, Enoch's parents don't need to worry about him or his siblings. They know their children are well cared for and supervised. And as a result, each family member is able to draw closer to the Lord.

Joni and Friends has become such an integral part of Enoch's family that they refer to our ministry as "Joni and Family." Thank you for your ongoing support that allows us to minister to families like Enoch's. You give families struggling with disability the gift of feeling loved. And you show people with autism that they are dearly valued, not just during Autism Acceptance Month in April, but all year long!



Tragedy struck without warning when thirty-two years ago, during a typical Sunday morning at church, a malfunctioning playground swing set left three-year-old Jennifer with quadriplegia. The emergency room doctor said it was the worst broken neck he had ever seen! Jennifer wasn't breathing on her own and her mom, Anne, began to mentally prepare for her little girl's funeral. But God had another plan. Jennifer not only survived... she grew into a powerhouse young woman with gifts, talents, and a purpose-driven life that inspires and motivates everyone around her!

In the beginning, one medical crisis after another plagued young Jennifer's broken body for months: a spinal fusion that required a body cast, the inability to talk due to a ventilator, fevers, pneumonia, and urinary tract infections. Through it all, Anne says that Jennifer "just kept smiling."

Five months after her accident, Jennifer's family was reunited when she returned home and they began adjusting to their "new normal" life, including home schooling for Jennifer. She thrived because she loved to learn, and Anne knew Jennifer would flourish in an actual school setting among her peers. Resistance from the special education teacher because of Jennifer's noisy ventilator and her unique challenges motivated Anne to press on and persist until, along with a personal nurse, attending class became a reality.

After an unexpected divorce, Anne became a single mom of three young children, adding to the daily burden she already shouldered. Just when she was close to her breaking point, Anne heard Joni talking about *Family Retreat* on her car radio. She immediately pulled over, called our Texas office, and signed up!

At *Family Retreat*, God met Anne's intense need for respite and connection. And while friends were not plentiful for Jennifer, she was surrounded by new friends who truly valued her. Now, twenty years later, Jennifer and her family serve as a strong witness to the transformative power of a Christ-focused community that embraces, encourages, and nurtures families grappling with the daily strain of disability. Today they serve as a light to other families who are crying out for friendship and hope!

God has even used Elijah and his family to be a catalyst within their own local church. Elijah now has a buddy who guides him through both the Sunday morning service and Sunday school each week. Dawn and Ben are excellent advocates for their own family and other families living with disability within their congregation. And this year, they're seeking to recruit more volunteers for Family *Retreat* from their church!

Family Retreat and all of our Christ-centered programs provide special needs families with a time of rest, fellowship, and biblical encouragement so they can return to their own church community refreshed and rejuvenated.
