eadly Southern California wildfires are a disaster beyond comprehension. With gale force winds, a severe drought, low humidity, and the hills thick with dry brush... this fire disaster happened so fast—so violently that everyone was caught off guard.

The fires erupted on January 7th, sweeping across greater Los Angeles and killing more than twenty people. Thousands have been displaced, more than 12,000 homes and businesses have been destroyed and, as we publish this newsletter, first responders are still actively fighting flare-ups as winds continue to gust. There's no doubt—this is a tragedy.

We have been praying for dear friends who have lost their homes, and for countless others who've lost even more. Then there are schools and nursing homes, grocery stores, gas stations, all of them destroyed. Perhaps you saw the footage of the long stretch of Malibu beachfront properties, all of them on the edge of the ocean virtually every house gone up in smoke. I've heard people wonder about God's purposes and plan. And I've pondered the same.

But this early on? I have no idea what God is doing. But I do know this: He is moving in people's hearts.

Neighbors are coming together and helping each other. Food and clothing are being distributed, and the Gospel is on display as churches set up distribution centers in their parking lots—providing water, bags of groceries, and diapers. Christians are sharing God's comfort, consolation, and eternal hope. There will come a time when God may make his plan more clear. But for now, the Gospel is going forth. And you and I can partner with God's will through our prayers. We can ask the Lord to pour out his consolation and comfort. For the Holy Spirit to mercifully draw families to Jesus Christ. And vulnerable disabled individuals and families who are struggling with trauma in the wake of this catastrophe.

Pray for Joni and Friends as we actively reach out to people with disabilities who need help. People with disabilities and their families have unique needs, and our ministry stands ready to provide Christ-centered love, Gospel encouragement, and practical resources. You sent to Kalyani in Nepal

ejected by her family, Kalyani lived on the streets and had to beg to survive. "I was alone in my time of suffering," she explains. "I was in much pain and poverty."

Kalyani recalls her older brother carrying her on his back when she was unable to keep up as a young child. But in time, her family abandoned her-unable to see her value as a human being and lacking the means to care for her.

Living with dwarfism in a culture that largely views people with disabilities as sub-human, Kalyani was given no opportunity to get an education. "When I heard the students reading at school, I wept because I could not attend school," she says.

Kalyani often had no way to meet her most basic needs. "When I had nowhere to stay, I went around in the caves, hills, and bridges. There was a time when I couldn't get water. I would ask and people would throw water and dirt at me. I don't like to think about those times."

When she met our Joni's House Nepal team, Kalyani found the kind of support she had ached for her entire life. We constructed a shed and pen for Kalyani to raise chickens, offering her dignity in her community and a sustainable source of income. Joni's *House* also provided the chicken feed, feeding pots, and materials Kalvani needs to grow her business. But more than economic help, Kalyani has also gained new hope and a sense of belonging.

"I used to have no one to help me," says Kalyani. "I used to weep and wander around. I had no parents to love and care for me. Now I feel like I found my parents whose love I did not have. I used to have no shelter and would get soaked by the rain. Now I have this shelter. Now I can raise some chickens and make money. I am happy."

When Kalyani recalls the exclusion and cruelty of her past, she points to her heart and says, "I am not scared... there is God in here. Men may try to despise us, but God does not despise us."

Thank you for sending immediate help and hope to people like Kalyani. Together, we are reaching into places where people with disabilities have little-to-no chance of hearing about Jesus!

Y urya is fifteen years old and has significant intellectual disabilities. He is largely nonverbal but can say "mom," "dad," "brother," and "sister." He also suffers from epilepsy. "Surva suddenly falls down," explains his father. "Sometimes he is as good as dead. Sometimes it leaves quickly-sometimes he suffers for an hour." This can happen up to ten times a day.

Surva needs someone with him at all times. He is unsafe on his own and won't cry out in pain or ask for food when he's hungry. His needs must be anticipated by his caregivers. And while it makes earning income extremely difficult, Surya's parents remain dedicated to their son.

"What shall we do?" his father asks. "We can't abandon him. We love our son. Until I die, I will look after him!"

For Surva's safety, his parents must keep him in a safe, enclosed space whenever they can't

attend to him. But a year ago, while he was briefly unsupervised, he fell into a fire and severely burned his hands. His father recalls, "He did not cry. He just came to me and said, 'Dad.' I went to get some paste for the burn. I felt very bad. I searched for medicine the whole day."

To help Surva's parents earn the income they need to survive and care for their son, Joni's House Nepal helped them establish a goatraising business. Through Joni's House, Surva's family received goats, and the training needed to rear them for income. Our team also provided construction materials and hands-on help to build a shed for the goats.

"Thank you very much, *Joni's House!*" says Surva's mother.

"We got much support. Thank you all!" adds Surva's father. "As long as there is life, there is hope!"

iving in a remote and rugged district in Nepal, Biraj's family hardly had the means to survive. And because Biraj is deaf, his family faces challenges far beyond their poverty. They do their best to provide for their three children, but every day they wonder... Will we be able to feed our sons today?

In the community where Biraj and his family live, people with disabilities are often marginalized and treated with disdain-even cut off from access to basic necessities. This is why our *Joni's House Nepal* team searches for families living with disability like Biraj's—to show them someone cares, give them hope, and provide vocational training and tools for them to make a living.

Each family in rural Nepal has unique needs. After getting to know Biraj and assessing his family's situation, Joni's House gave him a

tilling tractor to plough his field and neighboring fields to earn steady income. This key piece of equipment has made a meaningful difference in Biraj's life.

"We used to borrow a tractor from others for ploughing," says his wife. "We are very happy to get this tractor. With the money we earn we can buy clothes for the children. Thanks to Joni's House for the support!"

When Russ came to Family Retreat, he especially appreciated the opportunity to connect with other dads and talk about the unique challenges that come with disability-the financial impact of specialized vehicles and equipment, the rigors of daily caregiving, and the things special needs parents miss out on. For Russ, that was hiking.



"My family goes on flat paths to the river," says Jaycee. "But at Family Retreat, I went where we never could go-all the way up to the boulders. It was awesome!"

When Russ learned that his family could go on a substantial hike at Family Retreat-complete with the specialized equipment Jaycee needed-he was delighted. While he often takes Jaycee out on flat trails that are accessible with her wheelchair, he never expected the kind of adventure they enjoyed at Family Retreat.


